Helping Grade 1 and 2 to Learn French

Description and Goals

My friend and I join the primary grades 1 and 2 to help them improve their French. They are in the same French class, level A, so they already do speak French. I teach them how to read syllables, words and sentences. I also read books to them, assign them homework & I make them play with academic spelling games. In the future we may be able to actually plan a lesson and actually invent a game for the students.

Like I expected, this wasn't what I thought it to be. It was a lot more complicated to teach these children than I thought it would be. As soon as we arrived, the teacher told us what we would do. I taught two kids, a boy and a girl from grade 1. I taught them how to read and pronounce syllables with the sound 'O' and 'F'. They struggled a bit but I made it a game! The game included games with mister O and mister F and the sound they made, I made them repeat the sound they made until they understood the assignment.

However I came across a challenge with the young boy that was reading the letters inverted, he would read FO, OF. I had to teach him how to read but he kept making the mistake so I kept correcting him, nicely explaining that Mr F was in front of Mr O. After the lesson ended, I did alert the teacher on that problem he had.

I was extremely patient and helped them overcome their struggles. This was actually much harder than I thought it would be, teaching children isn't easy as they don't have any bases. They have to learn from scratch. I created a pleasant environment for them to work in, I always was gentle as they both were a little bit shy. I promoted teamwork, making them spell words with little magnetic letters, which they seemed to have enjoyed.

I was also able to see how my friend worked with the other children, therefore I adjusted my games slightly and she changed hers according to mine as we were able to see which ones the children preferred taking in that they have different personalities!

I have already learned a lot from that first class, not to underestimate working with children, to always be nice and caring and always reward them for their good work even with little mistakes. I have also discovered how much responsibility is attached to taking care of little kids,

Overall, this was a very successful lesson. I noticed that my personality changed in the presence of children. I talked more slowly and in a calmer manner. I really enjoyed this lesson, it really exposed my caring personality. Nonetheless, this lesson permitted me to get to know the students that I will be helping to learn, they weren't particularly eager to learn and I would say that they could've even been cold at times. However, that changed during the second class on the next Monday!

Flexibility Training and Yoga

Description and Goals

I am working on mastering the crow-pose (bakasana) in yoga, meaning staying in this pose for at least 10 seconds. This pose requires the use of many muscles across the body, including legs, arms and core. It tests my ability to use these muscles together and remain balanced and calm.

Today, I began my journey in mastering a yoga pose called the crow-pose. This pose requires me to keep my knees on the backs of my arms, lift my feet and lean forward while keeping my hands on the floor. This necessitates for me to maintain an immense amount of balance while doing the pose. It also tests core and arm strength in the process.

Following a 30 minute yoga video (focused on full body mobility, core strength and stretching), I decided to try this pose as it did not look as complex compared to others but was still much harder than anything I have ever tried before. I watched a video on Youtube about how to do this pose, I tried it myself a few times while watching the instructor.

At first, I couldn't figure out where to place my hand and it took some work having to rewatch the beginning section of the video multiple times. Additionally, I needed to figure out where to put my knees. The instructor's knees looked like they were at a higher position on her legs than mine were, but I realized that when she did the full pose, her knees had lowered down to where I had put mine. I kept falling over and it took a few minutes for me to even be able to lift one foot above the ground. One tip the instructor gave was to look slightly ahead and not directly at the ground beneath me, which ended up helping me keep my balance a bit longer. Over the course of 10-15 minutes, I had been able to lift both my feet off the ground but I could only hold the pose for around 1 second. I did this a few times just to get used to the position and the way to get there.

I noticed that my core always needed to be engaged while I kept my balance and pushed against the ground with my arms.

I really like this challenge because it is something I have never attempted before and I was happy with the basic progress I made. I have stretched and done workouts but have never tried to really master a difficult pose. I also have the chance to be outside and get some exercise which I always love.

My goal for next time is to try to do the pose for 2-3 seconds and remember to look ahead.

Student Council
